Rob Cross was also elim inated from the competition for a 7, £ second consecutive year on the eighth nig

Jonny Clayton threw a nine-darter against José 7, £ de Sousa on Night Three, and the ver y next day, de Sousa threw a nine-darter of his own against Nathan 7, £ Aspinall . He also hit 11 maximum scores of 180 during the match, equalling the Premier L eague record set by Gary 7, £ Anderson in 2011.[6] De Sousa threw 96 maximums du ring the tournament, surpassing Gary Anderson's record of 79.</p&gt; <p&gt;&lt;/p&gt; <p&gt;For the first time, 7, £ the playoffs featured four players from four n ations: Michael van Gerwen from the Netherlands, Jose de Sousa from Portugal, Na than 7, £ Aspinall from England, and Jonny Clayton from Wales.</p&gt; <p&gt;&lt;/p&gt; <p&gt;Jonny Clayton won his second individual televised title, defeating fell ow debutant José de 7, £ Sousa 11 5 in the final.
